

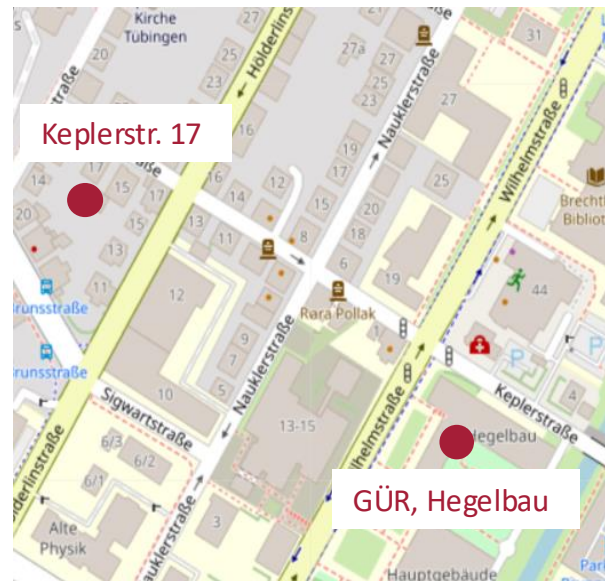
## Conference Description

The history of domesticating the vine and consuming wine has long been accompanied by numerous and varied representations of the plant and its grapes, apparently from the very beginning of this process. Over time, depending on the function and purpose of the individual representation of the vine, stylised or more detailed depictions have been created, descriptions (literary or scientific) have been written, symbolic values have been attributed to the plant and its fruits, and literary anecdotes and stories have been created regarding their effects, not to mention the associated culture and activities (such as the symposium or bibulousness) and (ir)responsible divinities. This conference aims to explore the representation of the vine in antiquity in relation to the social and anthropological functions of drinking wine, the development of ampelography as a scientific discipline, the use of the plant and its products in agriculture and medicine, the development of an aesthetic taste, and the attribution of symbolic/metaphorical meanings to the vine.
